Nearly 50 brothers traveled from near and far on July 25-26 to enjoy the second annual Escape to 117 Ash, a weekend of recreation and brotherhood at the house. This was a nice increase for our DU summer alumni weekend of fun, up from 30 the first year.

Many of the 26 alumni and 22 undergrads on hand Saturday played golf at Coldwater or frisbee golf on an ISU course on south Ash Avenue or played yard games. The evening featured a memorial in the courtyard followed by a grill-your-own steak dinner. Our college home of Delta Upsilon at Iowa State has never looked better. The event inaugurated the new yard sign shown in the pictures, and a rebuilt fire pit in the courtyard, suitable for both an open fire for social events and for grilling.

The afternoon of golf was filled with brotherhood in action. Each foursome included two alumni and two undergrads. Norm DeRaad '70

and his crew provided mobile beverages and took some excellent photos to document the fun. The best ball format allowed alumni to marvel at the long drives our undergrad teammates delivered. Eight under par (Jami Larson '74, Jeff Bodin '88, Matt Gunkelman '15 and Dustin Meyermann '16) won the cup. Refreshments near the 18th green topped off a great day of golf.

The memorial held in the courtyard was the emotional highlight of the day. Jim Sirois '63 traveled from Houston to dedicate the Old Gold and Blue study room in honor of deceased brother Dick Batcher '63. Jim, who was our eldest DU present, raised the sponsorship money from classmates to honor Dick.

Kammermeier named DU's top undergrad

We asked Sam Kammermeier '14 to share his award-winning experience at the DU Leadership Institute in Atlanta this summer. Here's how he was introduced as a finalist, and then his account of the ceremony:

Sam graduated this past December with a 3.4 GPA and was the recipient of numerous awards, including a Mentor scholarship for the Entrepreneurship and Innovation Learning Community and the Chev Adams Award and Scholarship. He served his chapter as President, Vice President Recruitment, and social chair, and was a leader during Iowa State's transition from colony to chapter in 2013. Sam also served the Iowa State Fraternity community at IFC President and dedicated his time as a volunteer for Arc of Story County, the Campustown Cleanup, and in the CyBiz Laboratory.



I was honored to receive the Delta Upsilon Distinguished Undergraduate of the Year award. It came as a big surprise to find out that I was even nominated to be honest. Here's what the award is all about:

The Distinguished Undergraduate award recognizes the time and effort given by an undergraduate brother for the improvement of his chapter, campus, and community. The award emphasizes the attributes of an undergraduate's involvement during his whole college career and it is the highest honor that can be bestowed on an undergraduate Delta Upsilon brother. The recipient has his name engraved on the permanent recognition plaque at the International Headquarters.

All of the finalists were flown in to participate in an interview which would ultimately decide the winner. Initially I was pretty nervous, because one of my competitors is working for Google; even my mom lost a little confidence when I told her that.

But their first question was, "How was Delta Upsilon important during your college career?" Then I knew I would be all right, since DU was essentially my entire college experience.

After regaling them with all of my ISU experiences, the judges shook my hand and I was free to go, until the banquet when the winner would be announced. During the banquet they played short videos of small sound bites that we had recorded previously detailing what DU meant to us, and some of our fonder moments.

Then came the announcement, by Steve Rowley, Ohio '65, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of DU's Educational Foundation (see photo) – and I heard my name! I was so in shock I just numbly started walking towards the podium, to shake his hand. He leans in and says, "Sam, we'd like you to say a few words." At this point, I'm not really in a position to decline. So I put my arms on the podium to stop them from shaking and started saying some words. Later that evening, Brother Rowley told me that he used to ask the award winners if they would like to say anything, but often they would say "no" – so now instead he just tells them to say a few words. I can see why.

The whole experience is still a blur, but I'm glad I did it. The Leadership Institute in Atlanta was one that I will value forever, especially considering that our chapter was a Sweepstakes Finalist! I am so honored to be part of such a great chapter and strong alumni base. I look forward to continuing my DU experience as an alumnus, and I know that the best times for the Iowa State chapter are still around the corner.

- We raised almost \$2,000 for GSI, which is the Delta U philanthropy and service project supporting an elementary school in Jamaica.
- We sent 14 men to DU leadership programs, including Reed Barron '18 who attended the DU Emerging Leaders program, had ten men at the Regional Leadership Academy last February in Kansas City, and three men at the Leadership Institute.
- We scored more than 350 points in the CEP, which lays out best practices for DU chapters.

Six other chapters were selected as Finalists – Carthage, Kansas State, Lehigh, Nebraska, Purdue and Rutgers. The Cornhusker DUs came out on top. We are honored to receive this recognition as one of DU's seven best chapters, and this recognition has stoked the fire in the chapter this year.

Going into the new school year, the men of the ISU chapter want to work to top our numbers last year, and compete again to be the Sweepstakes winner this year. So far, we have more than 70 members in the chapter and have raised more than \$2,500 for GSI. Besides planning for a huge turnout at DU leadership programs, we have one man qualified to represent ISU DU on the week-long GSI next May.

Our goals for this year are to get a 3.25 or more chapter GPA; to finish with around 75 members; to raise more than \$3,000 to send someone to GSI for free; and to finish with 700 points for CEP. We also want to send over 25 men to Delta Upsilon leadership conferences.

We want to thank all the alumni who helped the chapter strive to be the best it can be and achieve this honor. This has been a great experience for our chapter, and we will strive to continue to do great things!

This summer at Delta Upsilon Leadership Institute in Atlanta, the Iowa State Chapter was recognized as a Sweepstakes Finalist.

The Sweepstakes Trophy is the highest honor a chapter can receive and is based on certain requirements: chapter GPA, chapter size, Global Service Initiative fundraising, Chapter Excellence Plan points, and more.

As a chapter this past year:

- We earned a 3.21 overall GPA for Fall 2014, tied for fourth among IFC chapters.
- We had more than 60 members, ranking above the midpoint for fraternities in Ames.

We continue to strive to be excellent in everything we do. This fall, we have been competing in the annual Homecoming events at Iowa State with Alpha Gamma Delta sorority and Alpha Sigma Phi fraternity. We also had our first ever ice cream philanthropy, Delta Scoopsilon, where we served banana splits and raised money for Global Service Initiative. Even Matt Thomas and Georges Niang from the ISU men's basketball team were in attendance! We raised around \$2,500, in addition to a donation of \$500 by a brother's internship!

This fall, we have been selected to be a pilot chapter for the New Member Education program through the international fraternity. This consists of classes, associate member projects, and presentations by outside sources. We're really excited to be a pilot chapter and to give feedback to improve the program before it is launched next year in all DU chapters. Along with that, we brought back Classy Discussions every Wednesday, where as a chapter we talk about current news in society.

I'm also excited about the increasing involvement of our alumni. We have seen more alumni participate, from attendance at Escape to 117 Ash up to almost 50 men, to the new mentor program the Colonnades Club is putting together. I want to thank all alumni who have helped bring the chapter back, beginning four years ago; a lot has been accomplished in such a short amount of time!

This year is another beginning, but there is a lot of promise to it. The chapter has done exciting things since returning to campus and we will strive to continue to great things in the future.

Career mentoring program begins this fall at 117 Ash

The Colonnades Club has begun an exciting new Career Mentoring Program for our DU undergrads.

Craig Vermie '73, Mentor Program Director, said the concept is to match our undergrad brothers with one or more alumni who had the same undergrad major and job aspirations. The mentor program will simply allow our DU undergrads to reach out to alums to discuss undergrad majors, career direction and related advice and guidance.

From an initial call for mentors, about 30 DU alumni have stepped up so far. The mentoring relationship is intended to last one year, with an anticipated schedule of phone calls during the year. A biographical survey is available to interested alumni, so we can match each man with an appropriate undergrad.

Our purpose in Colonnades Club is to support and improve the quality of the Delta U experience at ISU. Personal contact between alumni and undergrads, during visits to the chapter house and events such as Homecoming and Escape to 117 Ash, is the best way to build the links that let alumni help as much as possible. The Career Mentoring Program is yet another way to achieve those personal contacts, from which so many DU alumni have benefitted over the years.

Here is an opportunity to give just a little bit back to the young men that carry on the DU tradition.

Don Greenwood '76 has been named to the Iowa State University Construction Engineering Hall of Fame. It recognizes individuals who have played a significant role in the construction industry and who have contributed to the ongoing success of the construction engineering program at Iowa State.

Don is president of Burns & McDonnell's Construction Division, based in the company's world headquarters in Kansas City, Mo. He was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1952. His love of math and science helped him discover a major at Iowa State that put them both into action – engineering. An internship at a construction company sparked his passion for building, where he learned how it intersects beautifully with engineering. He graduated in 1976 with a degree in civil engineering, having also lettered in football, and joined a small, local construction company, where he spent more than a decade experiencing all critical aspects of managing a successful construction project.

He joined Burns & McDonnell in 1994 as the first construction division employee and vice president of the Construction Group. Don is an Iowa State University Foundation Governor and in 2003 received the Professional Achievement Citation in Engineering from the College of Engineering. Don and his wife, Sharon, established the Greenwood Chair in Civil, Construction and Environmental Engineering to promote the university's world-class program and ensure the success of future engineers.



Jeff Courter '84 is completing his final year on the Board of Directors of the University of Iowa Alumni Association Board, in his roll as Past Chairman, after heading the group during the last year. He's also the Law School representative on the board.

Jeff, an attorney with Nyemaster Goode in Des Moines, recently served on the 21-member UI Presidential Search Committee comprising seven faculty, three Regents, staff and student leaders, and various other alumni and outside constituent groups. The committee gave the Regents a list of four recommended candidates for their interview process before the Regents selected Bruce Harrel as 21st President of U of Iowa.

In the Best Lawyers for 2016, Jeff was chosen as Lawyer of the Year in Des Moines for both Bankruptcy Litigation and Bankruptcy and Creditor Debtor Rights/Insolvency and Reorganization Law.

Departed DUs took many paths in life

Marty Wirt '61 died August 26, in Broomfield, Colo. He was born and raised on a farm in Burlington, where he was president of his senior class. He married Peggy Wirt in 1976 in Appleton, Wis. He served in the U.S. Navy as an officer aboard the USS Ingraham during the Vietnam War. He added a Harvard MBA to his Iowa State degree in chemical engineering.

After living in Glasgow, Scotland, he and his wife moved to Madison, Wis., and he worked for Rayovac until retiring in 2002. While with Rayovac, he spent 10 years as director of product development for lighting products, securing two U.S. patents. He then became the head of engineering and quality management at the manufacturing and packaging plants.

He lived a life of travel, accomplishments and commitment to his family. An avid golfer, he was a longtime member of Iron Oaks Golf Club in Chandler, Ariz., where he spent most of his retirement years. Survivors include his wife and two daughters.

James L. Sturtz '52, of Indianapolis, passed away on May 14. He was born November 11, 1927 in Boone, and after high school there joined the Navy before earning his degree at ISC. He played football during high school, college and Navy service. He worked for Swift & Co. in Chicago, was Sales Manager for Gold Seal (Mr. Bubble) in Indianapolis, and owned Diversified Underwriters Insurance. He was 20-year member of the Carmel Kiwanis Club.

Jarold "Jerry" Lein '62 died April 8, just weeks after he had stepped up to serve on the Colonnades Club board of directors. He lived in West Bloomfield, Mich., but passed away on the beach in St. George Island, Fla., where he was spending time with his family. A Clinton native, after ISU and his Air Force service, he settled in Detroit where he was a systems engineer with General Motors, EDS, and Verizon Wireless.

Jerry was active in Northbrook Presbyterian Church and enjoyed golfing and biking, and frequently helped friends and family with their computer problems. Jerry is survived by his wife Paulette, their three children, three grandchildren and two sisters.

James Arthur "Jim" Robinson '57 passed away at his home in Green Valley, Ariz., on January 6. Jim was born in Richland, Ia., and studied business at what was then ISC. He then embarked on a successful career in higher education development, including roles at Simpson College, U. of Miami, U. of Nebraska, and

culminating in 14 years' service as president of the West Virginia University Foundation, from which he retired in 1998.

A gregarious man devoted to his family, Jim was most in his element when surrounded by family and friends, who valued his good humor, keen wit and sound judgment. Jim was an enthusiastic golfer and fly fisherman. Jim is survived by Sharon, his wife of 56 years; their four children, and two sisters.

Larry Jay "L.J." Skeie '64 died July 30, 2014, in Litchfield, Conn., after a courageous battle with cancer. Born July 19, 1942, in Des Moines, he graduated from ISU with a degree in Industrial Engineering, and worked at Torrington Co. in Connecticut. In 1969 he married Nan Thoms and they moved to Ames, where he owned Skeie Pontiac-Saab. In 1982 he returned to Connecticut, and was with Torrington Brush Works and owned Solo Horton Brushes. His wife, two children and two grandchildren survive.

Richard M. Batcher '63, of Bettendorf, died unexpectedly at University Hospitals in Iowa City June 9, 2012. Dick was born August 9, 1941 in Waterloo. In 1967, he added an Iowa law degree to his B.S. in Mechanical Engineering, and married Lynn Haglund in Ottumwa.

He first practiced law at Heninger & Heninger in Davenport, then spent 38 years with Bozeman, Neighbor, Patten & Noe in Moline. He was a gentle man with an avid curiosity, taking college courses after law school, and tutoring high school physics students for fun. An avid reader, he loved the outdoors, in particular the Rocky Mountains. He took up running in his 50s and solo hiked 176 miles of the John Muir Trail in his 60s.

He was a 44-year member of St. Paul Lutheran Church, and belonged to the Scott and Rock Island county Bar Associations, the Bettendorf Rotary Club, the Transitions Board, the Quad City Astronomy Club and the Cornbelt Running Club. He is survived by his wife, their three children, a granddaughter and a brother. At 117 Ash, he is memorialized by the sponsorship of the Old Gold and Blue room on third floor, via funds raised under the direction of Jim Sirois '63.

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
